Chapter Membership Renewal Changes

In order to streamline the chapter membership renewal process for SMRA, we have instituted a new policy of renewing membership only twice a year. Traditionally, we sent notices out on a monthly basis to those whose memberships were expiring. We also sent out a maximum of two reminder notices to those who failed to respond.

The new policy was instituted to simplify record-keeping, reduce postage costs, and streamline the staff time required to administer membership renewals. Most importantly, the change to a twice-yearly mailing will cut down on our paper usage and help conserve trees.

In 2009, chapter members will receive only one renewal mailing from SMRA, in either February or August. We thank all our members in advance for responding promptly to these notices. This will allow us use the funds that we are saving for our primary mission of preserving and protecting the environment.

SMRA Scholarship Winners Talk About Their Experiences

Dylan Hastings, winner of a Larry Light Scholarship, on the Acadia Institute of Oceanography Summer Camp: "The scholarship allowed me to expand greatly my knowledge of the ocean environment as well as see a new part of the country."

Andrew Park, winner of a Larry Light Scholarship, on the Westchester County Ecology Day Camp CIT training program at Cranberry Lake Preserve: "It was a great experience. We learned a tremendous amount, not only about the environment but also how to take care of it ... I liked the way each day was a themed day such as survival day and rock quarry day because we could focus on a single objective and learn a lot about it. We learned about different studies of organisms (ornithology, herpetology), survival situations (how to make a fire and build a shelter), birds such as the red-eyed vireo (has a cool call), vernal pools, and my favorite-the smells of different trees and shrubs... I wish to continue learning about the environment in school."

Mary Charbonneau, adult scholarship winner, on the Maine Audubon Education Workshop at Hog Island: "I learned a great deal and was so inspired by the other teachers, naturalists, and Hog Island

staff and facilitators. I am eager to start applying the many tips and tools that were suggested for getting kids more actively involved in the learning process."

Saw Mill River Audubon will be offering a Larry Light Scholarship in 2009. The Larry Light Memorial Scholarship Fund for Youth was established by the Light family and their friends. The scholarship assists young people ages 13 to 17 years old who wish to attend a summer camp, class or workshop with an emphasis on the environment. Examples include a Westchester County ecology day camp, an oceanography institute, or a National Wildlife Federation camp. Youth scholarship awards depend on the program cost.
