FALL FOCUS: RAPTORS

Our field trips and programs this fall are centered around the theme of raptors, another name for birds of prey including eagles, hawks and falcons. We are offering a series of field trips to area hawk watches plus three workshops where you can learn more about: basic raptor identification (September 12), raptor photography (September 25) and a behind-thescenes look at hawk watches (November 3). We're also presenting a public program at the Chappaqua Library on October 29 in celebration of the 200th birthday of Edgar Allan Poe featuring live raptors and a live raven! Finally, don't miss our special program on biodiversity on September 15, co-sponsored with the Croton Arboretum. Study for Free! Summer 2010 Scholarship Applications Due December 31

This summer is not yet over but we are already looking ahead to next summer! Through the generosity of members and friends of Saw Mill River Audubon, we offer an annual summer scholarship program for adults and youth who want to expand their environmental learning. These scholarships are "interest based' not need based. That means we award these scholarships to those who can already demonstrate that they have an interest in the environment. This may be through volunteer activities, work experience and/or classwork.

The Larry Light Memorial Scholarship Fund for youth was established by the Light family and friends to help young people ages 13 to 17 who wish to attend a summer camp, class or workshop with an emphasis on the environment.

We particularly encourage students interested in participating in New York State's Department of Environmental Conservation camps. New Trails and New Map For Expanded Haas Sanctuary

Saw Mill River Audubon volunteers, board members, and staff have been hard at work at Haas Sanctuary the past few months establishing new trails, adding nest boxes, mapping the trails with GPS and studying the meadow plants. As this newsletter went to print, a Boy Scout Eagle project was underway restoring the stone wall along Sheather Road. We also anticipate adding a map box, kiosk and sign at the new entrance on Sheather Road. We are grateful to Campbell Engineering of Chappaqua for their generous assistance in helping us with a survey of the new entrance area. Haas Sanctuary work has been supported by a grant from the New York City Environmental Fund administrered for NYSDEC by the Hudson River Foundation. Tuesday, September 15 • 7:30 pm Program: Biodiversity-Why It Matters, Croton Library Co-sponsored with Croton Arboretum. Speaker, Dr. Mike Rubbo, **Director of Environmental Steward**ship, Teatown Lake Reservation. Dr Rubbo oversees the management of Teatown's 834-acre preserve and directs its scientific research program. His research has focused on the ecology of vernal pool ecosystems. He has authored numerous articles on ecology and conservation in international scientific journals as well as in the popular press.

Saturday, September 19 • 9:00 am Hawk Watch: Hook Mountain

Hook Mountain, just north of Nyack in Rockland County, offers eye-level views of migrating hawks and falcons and a spectacular 360 degree view of the lower Hudson Valley. Meet at Rockland Lake State Park at the Executive Golf Course parking lot. Moderate 30 minute hike to the hawk watching station at the summit of Hook Mountain.
