The seventh annual Hudson River EagleFest is a wonderful opportunity to view and celebrate the majestic bald eagles that overwinter along the Hudson River. Expert guides with spotting scopes will be located at the Riverfront Green in Peekskill, Georges Island County Park in Montrose and the Croton River boat ramp (just beyond the Croton train station). Visit Croton Point Park during the day for more events and exhibits inside large tents set up for this event.

The EagleFest is organized by Teatown Lake Reservation. Croton River boat ramp warming tent sponsored by SMRA. Christmas Bird Count Results

From December 14, 2010 through January 5, 2011 tens of thousands of volunteers throughout the Americas took part in an annual tradition that goes back over 100 years. This is the Christmas Bird Count (CBC), in which volunteers tally the number of species and individual birds seen between sunrise and sunset on the designated count day in each territory or "count circle." Audubon and other organizations use data collected in this longest-running wildlife census to assess the health of bird populations—and to help guide conservation action.

The Peekskill CBC took place on Saturday, Dec. 18th. Several members of Saw Mill River Audubon participated, including a number of high school students. Centered in northern West-chester, this count circle includes varied habitats from the brackish marshes of the Hudson River, eastward through the Croton Watershed of the New York City reservoir system, as well as interior woodlands, fields and freshwater wetlands.

The species count total was a respectable 98, with some highlighted species and numbers as follows: greater scaup (4); common merganser (4,262); northern goshawk (1); red-shouldered hawk (2); merlin (2); Virginia rail (1); common raven (6); horned lark (3); marsh wren (1); eastern bluebird (56); American pipit (1); field sparrow (5); eastern towhee (4); white-crowned sparrow; snow bunting (1); eastern meadowlark; purple finch (3); pine siskin (2).

Noteworthy is the remarkable, record-breaking number of

from a large flock located on the Hudson River off Verplanck. Inland reservoirs were mostly frozen over with a thin coating of ice, which likely pushed the birds to the river. Also

of note is that bald eagle numbers were somewhat depressed from what is typical on this count, with 18 individuals this year.

Audubon's Great Backyard Bird Count

The Great Backyard Bird Count (GBBC) is an annual 4-day event that engages birders of all ages in counting birds to create a real-time snapshot of where the birds are across the continent. Anyone can participate, from beginning bird watchers to experts. It's free, fun, and easy—and it helps the birds. You can count the birds you see in your backyard, off your balcony, at your local park, or from your window—anywhere you can spot birds! The 2011 GBBC will take place Friday, February 18, through Monday, February 21.

Participants count birds anywhere for as little or as long as they wish during the 4-day period. They tally the highest number of birds of each species seen together at any one time. To report their counts, they fill out an online checklist at the GBBC website, <u>www.birdsource.org</u>

As the count progresses, anyone with internet access can explore what is being reported from their own towns or anywhere in the United States and Canada. They can also see how this year's numbers compare with those from previous years. Participants may also send in photographs of the birds they see. A selection of images is posted in the online photo gallery at <u>www.birdsource.org</u>

Scientists and bird enthusiasts can learn a lot by knowing where the birds are. Bird populations are dynamic; they are constantly in flux. No single scientist or team of scientists could hope to document the complex distribution and movements of so many species in such a short time. This is why the thousands of participants in the GBBC make such an important contribution. The collaboration of scientists and citizens in citizen science projects like the GBBC and the Christmas Bird Count (see page 2) provides critical data that allows scientists to get a much clearer picture of the status of our bird populations.
