President's Message and Fall Audubon Council of New York

SMRA Executive Director Anne Swaim, board member Sarah Hansen and I attended the semi-annual meeting of the Audubon Council of New York in October. The Council brings together the 27 Audubon chapters in New York. The weekend's focus was partnerships, and Anne shared SMRA's successful partnership with Rockefeller State Park Preserve through the Connect Kids to Parks program.

We heard from several groups involved in the Montezuma Wetlands Complex: more than 50,000 acres of protected wetlands in northern Cayuga County, and home to Audubon New York's Montezuma Center, as well as 30,000 acres

owned by other conservation organizations and private landowners interested in wildlife conservation. (See Sarah's article below about the great birding there.) Chapters involved with Audubon's Great Lakes program reported on shoreline restoration projects with public, private, corporate, and citizen partnerships.

Audubon NY's initiatives for 2018 include supporting legislation to study lead ammunition impacts on wildlife and humans, pollinator and bird-friendly standards for ground-mounted solar sites, site standards for offshore wind development, and opposition to thermal solar development.

Autumn on the Hudson

On the first Sunday of Autumn, with its record-breaking warm temperatures, sixteen of us enjoyed the river breezes on our Constitution Marsh paddle.

Our guide Sarah helped us in and out of the canoes, making even the most inexperienced paddlers comfortable. The calm water gave us plenty of time to bird, and we enjoyed the chatter and the dart of a Belted Kingfisher and quick looks at a Marsh Wren. We saw Great Blue Herons, a pair of Snowy Egrets and a single Double-crested Cormorant. A juvenile Bald Eagle put on a show for us, soaring just overhead.

We saw a kettle of gulls, and a particularly persistent Ringbilled Gull we kept confusing with an errant Osprey. Sarah shared her extensive knowledge of the flora of the tidal marsh.

We hope to have another trip on the Marsh, a New York Audubon Important Bird Area (IBA), this spring. Check our calendar for updates. *Kathleen Williamson*

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Montezuma NWR At Dawn

On daybreak of the last morning of the New York Audubon Council meeting, SMRA President Valerie Lyle, Executive Director Anne Swaim and I went birding along Montezuma National Wildlife Refuge Wildlife Drive. Predawn light barely touched the gravel road. Our slow-moving car spooked American Robins, Song Sparrows, and Swamp Sparrows foraging for grit ahead of us. Countless Redwinged Blackbirds sang and called far within the wetland.

With the sun about to rise, the eastern sky glowed with color. Thousands of blackbirds, flock after flock, began streaming low over the reeds. A Peregrine Falcon rocketed towards them. We expected the blackbirds to mob the predator away, but we didn't see it again and presumed it stayed low to feast on a successful catch.

A long row of reeds bordering the road blocked our view of the expansive open pool. When we finally reached a viewable spot, hundreds of waterfowl dotted the water: swimming, bathing, feeding, fighting, and sleeping. Merely ten feet from the road, lap-dog-sized Pied-billed Grebes speedily dove, American Coots paddling just behind them. The more cautious ducks – warmed in the now golden sunlight – layered farther back, requiring binoculars and scopes. Gadwalls, American Wigeons, Ring-necks, Ruddy Ducks, Green-winged Teal, Canvasbacks, Redheads, Northern Shovelers, Northern Pintails, a lone Bufflehead drake. Anne estimated that there were 400 wigeons, theirs an incessant chorus of squeaky toy calls.

An adult Bald Eagle flew overhead just in front of us. Another raptor in pursuit of breakfast? Scores of ducks – the ones farthest away from the protective reed cover – took off. Canada Geese honked loudly in protest. The eagle passed through the flocks with majestic ease, then sharply pivoted. Testing our "ducks in flight" observation abilities, the waterfowl circled around to land while the eagle continued its flight, disappearing over the horizon.
