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At Pruyn Sanctuary, the new Plants for Birds garden for native plants and grasses has already grown way beyond expectations. This garden and the older but thriving butterfly and hummingbird garden attract a variety of pollinators and will provide seed for birds in the fall and winter. Stop by the garden open house on September 16. Through the efforts of SMRA, Feed the Birds in Croton, and Croton Point Park Naturalist John Phillips, a Purple Martin colony of at least 20 birds has been established at Croton Point Park: the only known such colony in the county.

Advocacy





H2H Continues to Grow

SMRA continues to participate in the Hudson to Housatonic Regional Conservation Partnership (H2H RCP). This past year has seen the transformation of the organization from the original U.S. Department of Agriculture-funded Conservation Initiative into an independent consortium of conservation organizations.

In support of the H2H mission to "advance the pace and practice of regional land protection and stewardship from the Hudson to the Housatonic by collaborating across boundaries to enhance the connection between people and nature," committees have worked on support for partners' conservation activities through municipal outreach, landowner/community engagement, and partner capacity and training.

A Sample of Audubon New York Legislative Initiatives

All Audubon chapters in New York State work with our state office, Audubon New York, in developing annual legislative resolutions. These statements focus our advocacy work in the coming year. Over 50,000 Audubon households across the state are a powerful voice for the environment in Albany.

Twenty legislative resolutions for 2018 are now under review by our state's Audubon chapters. Highlights from just three resolutions below overview some key advocacy issues.

Combat Climate Change & Urge Wise Energy Decisions

 Urge the Governor and Legislature to maintain funding for the New York Sun – Solar program, and the Clean Energy Fund and Greenbank; promote bird-friendly energy choices; assist in consumer energyefficiency decisions; and promote habitat protection to assist bird species as they respond to a changing climate. • Advocate that the New York Congressional Delegation support legislation to combat climate change, reduce dependency on fossil fuels, reduce CO2 emissions, and provide resources to protect birds, other wildlife, and their habitats from a changing climate.

Hudson River Protection & Restoration

- Ensure that the most stringent environmental regulations govern the transportation, distribution, and storage/anchorage of oil by rail cars and barges to ensure the health and safety of the river's communities and natural resources, including enforcement of tanker car safety, development of oil spill response plans, and opposition to any future barge anchorage proposals.
- Initiate studies that characterize, protect, and restore in-river spawning and nursery habitats, ecosystem changes and assessments of adult spawning stock, and juvenile surveys of both sturgeon and shad.

• Work with NYS DEC to hold EPA and GE accountable for the proper remediation of the Hudson River, ensuring a cleanup that meets the intended goals of the plan and complies with state standards.

Reduce Pesticide Use / Promote Bird-Friendly Yard and Garden Land Management

 Support programs and legislative initiatives designed to significantly reduce the use of pesticides and to implement Integrated Pest Management programs, include measures to restrict the current use of neonicotinoid pesticides until further analysis can be conducted on their impact on birds and pollinators.
