President's Message: Spring Update

Changes are coming to the Croton Point Grasslands.

Over the next few months, you will see the first stages of a 2-year project to remove invasive species and restore the habitat of this Important Bird Area. See Anne Swaim's article below for more details of the plan, including how SMRA has worked with county officials to ensure a successful outcome and to mitigate project impacts on the birds and other wildlife that depend on this area.

Please do not overlook the proxy ballot enclosed in this newsletter. We need your proxy vote to elect the new officer slate and members of the Board of Directors at our annual meeting on April 28.

This year there is an additional ballot item to vote on: a change to the incorporation of SMRA, reflecting changes that were made to New York State's nonprofit law after our original incorporation. Among other things, SMRA would change from a voting membership to a non-voting membership organization. With this change, SMRA members

will no longer vote on officers or appointments to the Board of Directors, as is common with many nonprofit organizations, including National Audubon. All other privileges of membership will remain in place. We are recommending this change because the annual proxy process is cumbersome, time-consuming, and costly to our organization. We urge you to vote yes on item 2 on the proxy to approve this change. Restoring Croton Point Grassland

Using state funding to its Soil and Water Conservation District, the County of Westchester is restoring valuable grassland atop the former landfill at Croton Point Park. Larry Weaner Landscape Associates designed the project, which is intended to curb less desirable, invasive plants in favor of more ecologically friendly native plants to improve wildlife habitat, especially for birds. Saw Mill River Audubon appreciates the opportunity we have had to review and comment on the plans as they developed with a focus on preserving existing areas of native grass that are important for nesting grasslands birds like Grasshopper Sparrow and Bobolink. During the project, much of the landfill hill will have a very different look as invasives are removed and before native species regrow. We encourage you to attend our Thursday, May 23rd program at the Croton Free Library to hear more about how the grassland restoration plan was developed and the project's timeline with an opportunity for you to ask any questions.

Starting 2019 with a First Day Hike

On New Year's Day 2019 I was pleased to lead one of the First Day Hikes sponsored across the state by New York State Parks. SMRA was the leader of the one at Rockwood Hall, part of Rockefeller State Park Preserve on the Hudson near Phelps Hospital. The walk was tasked to me. I didn't mind rising early New Year's Day because, seriously, who really goes out on New Year's Eve (amateur night at the tavern, and staying in also gives one time to put the finishing touches on one's "dead pool lists" before the midnight submission deadline)?

For the 2018 First Day walk, it was nine degrees at the 9:00 a.m. start and the NYS Parks' swag was a sticker (seriously, a sticker). Nonetheless, 14 brave souls showed up and we had some pretty good birds. This year the temperature was a balmy 55 degrees—fifth warmest on record for New York. As a result, 45 people met me at Rockwood Hall. Try leading a walk with 45 folks; it's not so easy to get everyone on the birds (of which there were few — junco was a highlight)!

There had not been much cold weather up to then so the river was wide open and devoid of waterfowl. However, a few close encounters with Red-tailed Hawks and Bald Eagles enthralled the throng, and merely walking the loop at Rockwood Hall with the beautiful specimen trees is always a great morning out. As for the swag, NYS Parks stepped up its game and I was able to give all in attendance a green head band (shade: forest or hunter green; I checked a paint chart.) See you all January 1, 2020.
