President's Message

Let's keep it simple.

Think globally, act locally. Or, as my wife frequently reminds me, don't plant bamboo.

It will be years before we understand the full measure of damage done to the environment domestically and abroad by the current federal administration's actions and neglect. The next four years will uniquely affect our environment far into the future. I think of DDT and the Bald Eagle, and how long it took an aware and motivated public-private partnership to reestablish the population.

Unlike financial markets, nature and science don't have an immediate, retaliatory response to bad policy...so it is up to us to do our best to continue to fight the good fight. I think that means a recommitment to one's individual efforts to protect the environment.

I urge you to double down in your efforts to make a difference. Why you might ask?

First, it is wonderfully distracting from the *sturm und drang* in Washington, which could otherwise take your breath away all day, every day; today we all have neighbors caught in that dryer cycle.

Second, our environment really needs you. When I reflect on the causes—neonicotinoids, dark skies, horseshoe crabs, bird-friendly windows, wildlife overpasses, pollinator preservation—that SMRA has advocated for locally, in Albany and nationwide, I realize our voices—as your voices—and others like us are the voices that do make a difference for these important issues.

While it is increasingly difficult to know who is listening nationally, we can and do make a difference in our local community and state governments.

Advocate with your elected representatives! They need to hear from you.

Join friends or local groups who pull invasive plants in public spaces, take part in bird counts, take hikes, go for a paddle, go geocaching, and engage younger generations in adventuring and appreciating nature on a local level. Without a dedicated effort to appreciate, preserve and improve our environment, in a couple of generations they won't even know what they've lost.



NY/CT Audubon Chapter Leaders' Weekend: Spotlight on Bird-Window Collision Prevention

Saw Mill River Audubon participated in the Spring 2025 NY/CT Audubon Council Meeting, April 4–6 in Glens Falls, alongside leaders from 21 other chapters across New York and Connecticut. This gathering provided valuable opportunities to advance our conservation initiatives, with a focus on reducing bird-window collisions.

Bird-Window Collision Prevention Initiative

A highlight of the weekend was learning about the coordinated bird-window collision prevention project that several Audubon chapters developed together. Susan O'Handley, Delaware Otsego Audubon, presented this

joint chapter initiative on Friday evening, which provides materials, including brochures, PowerPoint presentation and script, and large banner, to help all chapters with local programming. This collaborative effort addresses one of the leading causes of bird mortality in our region.

The collision prevention focus continued with Meredith Barges of SUNY Environmental Science and Forestry and Onondaga Audubon, who introduced "Bird Collisions in the Anthropocene," an interactive art project where participants created birds from upcycled cloth to represent actual bird collision deaths. These cloth birds will be combined with others from around the country in one or more future displays. This project combines conservation awareness with community engagement.

On Sunday, Erin McGrath, Policy Director, provided a summary of NYS legislation, and advocacy training specifically related to Lights Out initiatives and bird-friendly building policies through legislative channels.

The Onondaga Audubon team also shared their successful Lights Out Central New York collaboration, offering a blueprint for similar efforts across the region.

Additional Weekend Highlights

The meeting included presentations from National Audubon leadership, including Mike Burger, Executive Director for the NY and CT regional office, who addressed the recent State of the Birds Report showing U.S. birds declining sharply and emphasized the urgency of "bending the bird curve" to reverse population declines.

Field trips to the Betar Byway and a historical tour of Glens Falls provided opportunities for connection, despite the rainy weather. The weekend concluded with recognition of John Loz of Southern Adirondack Audubon Society, who received the Stotz Award for his significant contributions to Audubon New York.
